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"BETTER NEVER RESTS" SEASON OUTLOOK



The Georgia Bulldogs have captured back-to-back College Football Playoff Championships, something that had never been done, and while that is indeed impressive, Kirby Smart and the Bulldogs have turned their attention to the 2023 season. Preseason media chatter centered on the possibility of a three-peat by Georgia, and that hasn't been done since Minnesota (1934-36). Ask Smart and the Bulldogs about that, and they'll tell you their focus is on the threat of complacency.

"This year, we studied the New Zealand All-Blacks, the most successful sports team in the history of really teams, over 100 years they've had the highest winning percentage," said Smart at SEC Media Days this year. "We took a deep dive, took a title and a mantra from them and studied those things because we don't want complacency. They've done it better than anybody else, and we use that. One of their big mantras is 'better never rests.' We believe that. Our kids understand it. Our kids have learned it."

Smart added that the Bulldogs will be driven by intrinsic motivation, and that the 2023 team is still defining itself. Their identity will be forged through summer workouts and fall camp.

BROCK BOWERS won the John Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end in 2022.

Vandagriff played in three games with limited snaps and will join second-year quarterback Gunner Stockton, who redshirted in 2022, in the battle at quarterback.

RUNNING BACKS

Seniors Daijun Edwards and Kendall Milton are Georgia's top returners in the backfield after the duo combined for more than 1,300 yards and 15 touchdowns last season. Edwards added 101 yards receiving for the Bulldogs in 2022 while Milton had a receiving touchdown to complement his performance. Branson Robinson added additional firepower at running back last year with 68 carries for 330 yards and three scores during his first season in red and black. Fellow 2022 freshman Andrew Paul is expected to join the competition after sustaining a knee injury at the start of last year's fall camp. Sevaughn Clark and Cash Jones each had limited time with the offense last year and will return along with early enrollee Roderick Robinson II.

What follows is a position-by-position outlook heading into camp:

QUARTERBACKS

The Bulldogs are looking to fill the starting spot behind center for two-year starter Stetson Bennett, who was the Offensive MVP in each of the last two CFP Semifinal and National Championship contests. Junior Carson Beck returns for the 2023 season having served as Georgia's primary backup last year. Beck completed 26 of 35 passes for 310 yards and four touchdowns. He also averaged 6.1 yards per carry after having seven rushes for 48 yards during the Bulldogs' defense of the national championship. Redshirt sophomore Brock

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TIGHT ENDS

Georgia has boasted one of the deepest tight end rooms in the country recently and that trend will not change. John Mackey Award winner (nation's top tight end) and All-American Brock Bowers returns to the fold after hauling in a team-leading 63 catches for 942 yards and seven touchdowns while starting 14 of the Bulldogs' 15 contests. The versatile Bowers' threat as a rusher also grew as the Napa, California, native took nine carries 109 yards and three scores. One of the nation's best at the position during high school and a 2022 early enrollee, Oscar Delp saw an increased role late in the year to finish with five catches for 61 yards and a touchdown. Bowers and Delp also

continued their development as solid blockers for a Georgia defense that averaged 41.1 points per game. Determined to stay at the top at tight end the Bulldogs added highly-touted Pearce Spurlin III and Bulldog legacy Lawson Luckie as early enrollees while also welcoming David Lalaian to the roster.


WIDE RECEIVERS

The Bulldogs utilized a varied passing attack during their 15-0 run to keep defenses off balance. Ladd McConkey was the team's second-leading receiver with 58 receptions for 762 yards and a team-leading seven touchdowns and is back for his fourth-year junior season. Senior Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint will also be a go-to out wide after starting eight games last season and finishing with 29 receptions for 337 yards and two scores. Speedster Arian Smith is another starting option on the outside after he averaged 28.3 yards per catch during his seven receptions in 2022. Dillon Bell, Jackson Meeks, Mehki Mews and De'Nylon Morrissette have also been under receivers coach Bryan McClendon for a year and know the system. Freshmen last year, C.J. Smith and Cole Speer are also battling for time at the position. With the natural attrition in today's game, the Bulldogs also bulked up with a talented group of early enrollees in Anthony Evans III, A.J. Harris, Zeed Haynes, Tyler Williams and Izayah Reeves and picked up former Missouri receiver Dominic Lovett and former Mississippi State target Rara Thomas, among other summer enrollees.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Center Sedrick Van Pran was one of only two linemen who started every game for last year's squad that averaged a school record 501.1 yards per game. He will join returning starting guards Tate Ratledge and Xavier Truss on a line that was a finalist for the Joe Moore Award (nation's top offensive line) in 2022. Junior Amarius Mims started the CFP Semifinal and the National Championship game for an injured Warren McClendon and is back to become a regular starter in 2023. Austin Blaske, who played on primarily special teams or in goal-line situations, Dylan Fairchild, Chad Lindberg, Micah Morris and Jared Wilson are aiming to fill the gaps left by the departed lettermen as well. Four scholarship Bulltogs redshirted last year and will be on offensive line coach Stacey Searels' radar as well this spring, including Aliou Bah, Drew Bobo and Earnest Greene III. The 2023 early enrollee class included Monroe Freeling and Joshua Miller as they add more depth.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN



CARSON BECK saw action in seven games in 2022 as the Bulldogs' primary backup quarterback.

Ingram-Dawkins are in the rotation up front and will be targeting more havoc plays this season. Third and second-year players Jonathan Jefferson and Christen Miller are also predicted to share time in the middle as well. Finally, early enrollees Jordan Hall and Jamaal Jarrett got to campus in January and could get early reps.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

Second-year coach Chidera Uizo-Diribe will be in search of filling the spots vacated by veterans Nolan Smith and Robert Beal. When Smith went down with a pectoral injury versus Florida, Chaz Chambliss filled in and logged 16 tackles, including three tackles for loss and two sacks. Jalon Walker wasted no time last year breaking into the rotation as the firstyear linebacker highlighted his opening season with nine stops, including two tackles for loss, and a blocked punt against Kent State in just his fourth collegiate game. Also going into their second seasons, it will be time for Marvin Jones Jr., Darris Smith and C.J. Madden to establish their place among Georgia's defensive stoppers. The Bulldogs bulked their depth at the position by adding a trio of talented linebackers in Gabe Harris, Sam M'Pemba and Damon Wilson Jr., who all started school in January.

Smart agrees that games are won and lost on both lines and the Bulldogs have been particularly stout on the defensive line the past two seasons. Senior Nazir Stackhouse and sophomore Mykel Williams each played in all 15 games last season with Stackhouse starting all 15 and Williams getting the nod in a pair. The duo combined for 61 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks and a blocked field goal versus No. 13 LSU in the SEC Championship Game. They will be complemented by Zion Logue, who had six starts and finished with 16 stops, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Arguably one of the most consistent veterans in the group is also back for another year as Tramel Walthour will attempt to improve on his 24 stops in 13 starts last year. In addition, Warren Brinson and Tyrion

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

The heart of Georgia's defense that allowed only 14.3 points per game and that gave up a single touchdown in the CFP National Championship returns at inside linebacker. Junior Smael Mondon was the unit's leading tackler with 76 stops, and he added one of 12 interceptions for Georgia. His friend and teammate Jamon Dumas-Johnson, who earned All-America honors in 2022, was next on the tacklers' list

thanks to his 70 stops and a team-leading nine tackles for loss. With several games collectively under their belt, Xavian Sorey and E.J. Lightsey will provide depth along with early enrollee additions C.J. Allen and Raylen Wilson.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Javon Bullard established himself as one of the nation's dominating forces on Georgia's defense during the final two games of 2022. He was named the Defensive MVP after both the CFP Semifinal versus No. 4 Ohio State and CFP National Championship versus No. 3 TCU. The Milledgeville native had a pick during the win over the Horned Frogs and provided a pivotal pass breakup in the opposing end zone as he aims to improve on those performances as a junior. It took all of one game to see Malaki Starks' collegiate potential after he had an interception and eight tackles during the victory over No. 11 Oregon. Kamari Lassiter, who started all 15 games as a sophomore, is back as one of the corners after collecting 38 stops and five tackles for loss in 2022. Playing a large role in the first seven games last season, Dan Jackson returns from an injury and subsequent rehab to play alongside Starks at safety. Tykee Smith headlines another group including Daniel David-Sisavanh, Daylen Everette and Nyland Green who **GEORGIA** returns several key starters from last year's defensive unit that was ranked fifth nationally in scoring defense.

William Mote, who shared duties with Payne Walker, returns to snap for both field goals and punts. Jonathan Washburn returns as a backup at the position. At returner, Ladd McConkey will be available as an option after having 16 punt returns for 197 yards and Daijun Edwards also returned a pair of kickoffs in 2022 for 37 yards and is back. As usual, Smart will aim to discover a new batch of talent on special teams as the preseason camp unfolds.



will be targeting increased roles this fall along with JaCorey Thomas. The depth at defensive back got even deeper with early enrollees Joenel Aguero and Justyn Rhett getting their first Bulldog snaps this spring.

SPECIALISTS

Australian punter Brett Thorson returns for his sophomore season after averaging 45 yards per kick last year, including a 75-yarder that pinned No. 1 Tennessee inside its 5-yard line. Noah Jones is in place to back Thorson up. Georgia will have to replace Jack Podlesny at place-kicker/kickoff specialist and junior Jared Zirkel and freshman Peyton Woodring are in position to battle for that role after backing up Podlesny.

Inside linebacker **SMAEL MONDON** led the Bulldogs in 2022 with 76 total tackles.


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
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BTH SEASON AT GEORGIA HEAD COACH KIRBY SMART

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ack-to-back College Football Playoff National Championships (2021, '22), a 2017 CFP title game appearance, Southeastern Conference Championships in 2017 and 2022, five SEC Eastern Division titles, 81 wins and seven bowl victories are more than respectable rewards over a seven-year period. That's what Georgia got when it hired former Georgia player and Alabama defensive coordinator Kirby Smart to head the program in December of 2015.

His impact, along with a stellar coaching staff, players and a passionate fan base has put Georgia on the national stage seven years running. The Bulldogs enter the 2023 season having won 33 of their last 34 games.

2022 — Georgia captured its second consecutive CFP national championship and second SEC title of the Smart era in dominant fashion. The Bulldogs went 12-0 in the regular season and soundly defeated LSU in the SEC title game, earning a No. 1 seed in the final CFP rankings. The Bulldogs then came back to defeat No. 4 Ohio State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl CFP semifinal and left little doubt who was the best team in the land with a 65-7 trouncing of TCU in the CFP title game at SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, California. The Bulldogs were the only team to finish the 2022 season nationally ranked in the top five for scoring offense (41.1 points per game) and scoring defense (14.3 ppg). The 2022 senior class posted a 49-5 mark with two national championships and one SEC title.

2021 — Smart's 2021 team became UGA's first national champion since 1980, the first since 1982 to go undefeated in the SEC regular season, the first to be ranked No. 1 by all the major national polls and the first ever to win 14 games. It marked his fifth straight team to finish the regular season ranked in the top 10 of the College Football Playoff rankings. The team set 21 school records, highlighted by the nation's top-ranked defense. The third-ranked Bulldogs defeated No. 2 Michigan, 34-11, in the Capital One Orange Bowl in Miami and then No. 1 Alabama, 33-18, in the championship game in Indianapolis. The senior class also set the mark for most career wins by going 45-8. After the regular season, Smart was named SEC Coach of the Year for the second time in five years. Georgia's championship season enjoyed a fitting exclamation mark at the 2022 NFL Draft. The Bulldogs set a draft record with 15 players taken, including five defenders in the first round, led by the first overall selection, junior Travon Walker.

2020 — The 2020 Bulldogs became Smart's fourth consecutive team to earn a New Year's Six bowl game appearance. With a Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl victory over undefeated Cincinnati on Jan. 1, 2021, the Bulldog seniors tied the record for the most wins by one class in school history (44).

2019 — Smart's 2019 Bulldogs became the first team in school history to win 11 or more games for a third-straight season. Georgia defeated three teams in the final Top 15 CFP ranking — Notre Dame, Florida and Auburn — and finished fourth in the final polls. The Bulldogs capped their season with a dominant victory over Baylor in the Allstate Sugar Bowl game.

2018 — Georgia posted an 11-1 regular season record, a second straight SEC Eastern Division title, and a ranking as high as number four in the CFP poll. Georgia landed in the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 — the program's 10th all-time appearance in the New Orleans classic.

2017 — Smart's second season was a special one, with an 11-1 regular-season record, an SEC title, a win over Oklahoma in the Rose Bowl Game (CFP semifinal) and advancement to the CFP National Championship Game. It was the first conference title since 2005 for the Red and Black.

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HEAD COACH KIRBY SMART

Both Smart and his players reaped the bounty of their banner 2017 season. He was named George Munger National Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club, SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and SEC Coaches, and the Regional Coach of the Year by the AFCA. Roquan Smith earned first-team All-America honors and the Dick Butkus Award as the nation's top linebacker.

2016 - In Smart's first season leading the Bulldogs, Georgia made its 20th straight bowl appearance and posted four fourth-quarter comebacks, including wins over No. 8 Auburn and No. 22 UNC. He led the Bulldogs to an 8-5 final record, which included a victory over TCU in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

When Smart officially came home to Georgia on Dec. 6, 2015, he had unfinished business as defensive coordinator at Alabama, which was still chasing a national title. He juggled both jobs for a month until Jan. 11, 2016, when the Crimson Tide won its fourth national championship in a seven-year span. Twelve hours later, he was at work in Athens, where he remains one of 10 head coaches at schools from Power Five conferences that are coaching at their alma maters.

Smart had served on the Alabama staff the previous nine years, seven as defensive coordinator. During his tenure at Alabama, the Crimson Tide won three BCS National Championships, one CFP national title, three SEC crowns, six SEC Western Division titles, and was ranked in the nation's final top 10 eight years in a row.

During Smart's time at Alabama, he coached players at three different positions, in addition to his coordinating duties. He was recognized as the 2012 AFCA Assistant Coach of the Year and the 2009 Broyles Award winner as college football's top assistant. He also was a finalist for the award in 2015.

Prior to joining the Alabama staff in 2007, Smart spent the 2006 season as safeties coach with the NFL's Miami Dolphins. He served six years on the collegiate level as the running backs coach at Georgia (2005), defensive backs coach at LSU (2004), graduate assistant at Florida State (2002-03), defensive coordinator/ linebackers coach (2001) and defensive backs coach (2000) at Valdosta State, and administrative assistant at Georgia (1999).

Smart was the running backs coach for Georgia's 2005 SEC Championship team. He coached Thomas Brown, Danny Ware and Kregg Lumpkin — all future NFL players. In 2004 at LSU, he tutored two NFL draft picks: Corey Webster (2nd round, New York Giants) and Travis Daniels (4th round, Miami).

Smart was a four-year letterman at defensive back for Georgia, where he was a First-Team All-SEC pick as a senior. He finished his career with 13 interceptions, a mark that still ranks sixth in UGA annals, and paced the Bulldogs with six interceptions in 1997 and five in 1998. He led the SEC in interceptions during his final season.

A four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll, Smart received his bachelor's degree in Finance from Georgia in 1998 and his master's in Physical Education from Florida State in 2003.

The Bainbridge, Georgia, native is married to the former Mary Beth Lycett of McDonough, Georgia, a four-year letterwinner and two-year starter on the Georgia women's basketball team from 2000-03. The couple met long after their undergraduate days at Georgia, when Lycett — then working in the UGA Athletic Association Business Office - helped arrange Smart's trip to interview for the Bulldogs' running backs coaching job in 2005. They are the proud parents of twins Weston and Julia (born Feb. 8, 2008) and son Andrew (born May 25, 2012).

Kirby and Mary Beth Smart also oversee the Kirby Smart Family Foundation, which is focused on being champions in the community by supporting needy children and families facing adversity.

eorgia had three players taken during the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft, giving the Bulldogs a pick in the opening round for the sixth straight year.

The Bulldogs' three first rounders tied the second-most players selected in the first round in school history (2018). Following a record-breaking five in 2022, Georgia has now had eight players selected in the opening round over the last two years.

The Philadelphia Eagles traded up to take defensive lineman Jalen Carter with the ninth overall pick, marking the seventh Georgia defensive player taken in the top 10 picks since 1999. Five picks later, the Pittsburgh Steelers traded up to get offensive tackle Broderick Jones with the 14th overall pick. This marks the fifth Georgia offensive lineman taken in the first round since 2000. The Eagles returned later in the round to select linebacker Nolan Smith with the 30th overall pick after the organization advanced to this past season's Super Bowl.

At least one Bulldog defensive player has been selected in the first round in five of the past six NFL drafts. With Carter and Jones both going, there have now been eight instances since 2013 of the same school having a first round offensive and defensive lineman in the same draft. The Bulldogs have now had 27 linebackers drafted since 2000, which is tops in the nation.

Carter and Smith mark the third and fourth Bulldogs taken by the Eagles in the last two drafts and the 24th and 25th Georgia players taken by Philadelphia since 1943. Most recently, Jordan Davis was taken 13th overall last year by the Eagles and Nakobe Dean was the 83rd overall pick in the third round of the 2022 draft by the organization. While the Bulldogs have had two No. 9 overall selections in history, the most recent pick at that spot was Leonard Floyd by the Chicago Bears in 2016. After the first round, Georgia had seven more selections during the 2023 draft. Georgia's 10 overall picks ranked as the second-most in program history, while tying with Alabama for the national lead. The Bulldogs' draft count also eclipsed double-digits for the second-straight year, giving the program at least seven players picked for the fifthconsecutive draft. Last year, Georgia set a new NFL record for a seven-round draft (1994-present) with 15 selections. With 25 players selected over the past two years, Georgia set a record for the most drafted players in a two-year span during the Common Draft era (1966-present). Through seven seasons of head coach Kirby Smart's tenure, the program has produced 54 total draftees.

RULES SEC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

SEC DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event of a tie for the division championship, the following procedures will be used to break all ties to determine the SEC Football Championship Game representative.

1. TWO-TEAM TIE

(If two teams are tied for a division title, the following procedures will be used in order.)

- A. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams;
- B. Records of the tied teams within the division;
- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall (divisional and non-divisional) Conference record, and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional or non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division;
- G. Best cumulative Conference winning percentage of non-divisional opponents; and
- H. Coin flip of the tied teams.

2. THREE-TEAM (OR MORE) TIE

(If three teams or more are tied for a division title, the following procedures will be used in order. If one of the procedures results in one team being eliminated and two remaining, the two-team tiebreaker as stated above will be used.)

- A. Combined head to head record among the tied teams;
- B. Record of the tied teams within the division;


- C. Head-to-head competition against the team within the division with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through the division (multiple ties within the division will be broken from first to last and a tie for first place will be broken before a tie for fourth place);
- D. Overall Conference record against non-divisional teams;
- E. Combined record against all common non-divisional teams;
- F. Record against the common non-divisional team with the best overall Conference record (divisional and non-divisional) and proceeding through other common non-divisional teams based on their order of finish within their division; and
- G. Best cumulative Conference winning percentage of non-divisional opponents (Note: If two teams' non-divisional opponents have the same cumulative record, then the two-team tiebreaker procedures apply. If four teams are tied, and three teams' non-divisional opponents have the same cumulative record, the threeteam tiebreaker procedures will be used beginning with 2.A.);
- H. Coin flip of the tied teams with the team with the odd result being the representative (Example: If there are two teams with tails and one team with heads, the team with heads is the representative.)



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SANFORD STADIUM



ith a \$25 million expansion completed in 2003 and another \$8 million in 2004, Sanford Stadium added a second upper deck on the north side and 27 new north side SkySuites bringing the new stadium capacity to 92,746 — the ninth largest on-campus stadium in the country.

Named for the late Dr. S. V. Sanford, former president of the University and Chancellor of the University system, Georgia's Sanford Stadium celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2004. An overflow crowd of 30,000 saw the stadium's first game on October 12, 1929, when Yale University made its only trip South. Georgia won the now famous game when a young sophomore end from Macon, Vernon "Catfish" Smith, scored all 15 of the Bulldogs' points. Final score, Georgia 15, Yale 0.

Through the years, the stadium has experienced various expansion projects. In 1940, lights were added to the field level paving the way to the first Sanford Stadium night game, a 7-7 tie between Georgia and Kentucky on Oct. 26, 1940.

Eventually, the East end of the stadium was enclosed, more lights added, and the capacity increased to 82,122. The 1991 project enclosed the West end at a cost of \$3.7 million. The price tag was rather hefty, considering that the original price to build the stadium was a mere \$360,000.

Sanford Stadium added yet another chapter to its history by hosting the medal round of the 1996 Olympic men's and women's soccer competition, watched via television by over 3 billion people around the world.

Prior to Georgia's 2019 home opener, the playing field at Sanford Stadium was formally renamed in honor of Vince Dooley, the Bulldogs' all-time winningest head coach. Dooley served as head football coach of the Bulldogs from 1963 through 1989 and director of athletics from 1979 to 2004. As head coach, he won 201 games, one national championship and six SEC championships. While Dooley was athletic director, UGA won 23 national championships and 78 SEC team championships.

DR. STEADMAN V. SANFORD

Born Aug. 20, 1871, Dr. Steadman Vincent Sanford joined the Georgia faculty in 1903 and instantly became one of the University's most popular people.

He founded the Henry W. Grady School of Journalism in 1921, served as University Dean from 1927-32, and held the post of University president and chancellor until 1935 when he was named chancellor of the entire University System of Georgia.



He also held the position of faculty chairman of athletics while on the UGA faculty. He was the force behind the construction of Sanford Stadium in 1929 and was termed many times as "the best friend of athletics."

He was largely responsible for persuading the Bulldogs of Yale to make their first trip south of the Mason-Dixon line to play the dedication game of Sanford Stadium in 1929. He died Sept. 15, 1945.







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GAMEDAY TRAFFIC INFORMATION



o one likes to sit in traffic, but when more than 100,000 people descend upon the smallest county in Georgia on a Saturday, crowded roadways are inevitable. To ease the congestion, extra police and gameday staff work before and after games to assist the flow of traffic.

PREGAME TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

On gameday, some roads surrounding Athens — most notably SR 316 — become overcrowded because of the large number of vehicles headed to the game from the Atlantaarea. We want to remind you that there are many other ways to enter Athens, including US 129, US 29, US 441, SR 15 and US 78. While these routes may seem a few miles out of your way, they may save you significant time and less traffic congestion.

Once in Athens, we recommend you head toward East Campus, unless you have passes for other lots. The highest concentration of public parking on gameday is available on East Campus, surrounding the Ramsey Center off College Station Road. In addition, there are more than 1,500 overflow spaces at the intramural fields to help accommodate cars and make the postgame exit as simple and expedient as possible.

GAMEDAY PARKING

As football season approaches, you will notice a few changes to traffic patterns and parking on East Campus.

Since the railroad trestle has been removed, the Railroad lot (N08) is now separated into two parking lots. There is no longer internal access for vehicles between the south and north ends of N08 (see map). Vehicle access to the North Railroad lot is only available via South Thomas Street. Access to the South Railroad lot is from East Campus Road.

Police and parking attendants will be available at all open lots to direct traffic and answer questions.

SENSORY ROOM

Sensory rooms help create a safe and calming environment for individuals with sensory needs so they can take a break from an event, decompress and join the event again. The sensory room is located on the 100-level south side concourse near section 128.

COMPLIMENTARY SHUTTLE SERVICE

Complimentary shuttle from Ramsey Center/Rec Sports Complex to Gate 6 before and after games is available. UGA Campus Transit will again offer free shuttle service to fans on gameday from the East Campus Parking Deck/Ramsey Center bus area. If overflow parking is needed at the Intramural Fields, then shuttles also will pick up fans at the Intramural Fields parking area off College Station Road. Due to postgame traffic patterns, shuttles returning to the intramural fields after the game will unload at the intersection of East Campus Road and College Station Road.

Shuttles will run continuously for three and a half hours before the scheduled game time and will drop fans off at Gate 6 of Sanford Stadium until 15 minutes after kickoff. Keep in mind that the gates to Sanford Stadium do not open until two hours prior to the scheduled game time. Return service will run continuously for two hours after the game ends.

POSTGAME TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT


When planning your departure, keep in mind that vehicles that arrived on campus over the course of several hours will be trying to leave in a much shorter time. The large influx of vehicles on the roadway can quickly lead to traffic gridlock.

To alleviate this, the University of Georgia Police Department, the Athens-Clarke County Police Department and other local law enforcement agencies have produced a traffic plan that is implemented on gameday. The plan allows a large number of vehicles to move as efficiently as possible.

Please work with officers directing traffic to ensure that this plan runs smoothly.

Once the game ends, staff will direct cars to the Georgia 10 Loop, which circles Athens and provides the easiest access to all routes out of town. Staff may send you in a direction you are not used to going, but please don't turn around in the median. Remember, the Loop is a circle. Instead, follow the signs, and you will eventually get to your desired destination — probably faster than you think. When in doubt, stay patient, find the Loop and drive safely — we want to see you at the next home game!

GAMEDAY GAMEPLAN



aturdays in Athens are an exciting time. More than 100,000 fans pour into Athens on gamedays, and it takes each of us doing our part to make the day successful. To preserve the unique settings that make gamedays in Athens one of a kind, the University and the Athletic Association ask that fans adhere to the following guidelines to

better preserve our campus and make gamedays a great day for everyone. It is our hope that everyone will continue to enjoy an incredible gameday experience and a safe, family-friendly environment.

Your first stop as you plan for gamedays should be www.gameday.uga.edu. This site includes parking maps and all the details you need to plan for another exciting season of Georgia football. On these pages, you will find some key information to make your gameday safe and enjoyable.

SET UP AFTER 7 A.M.

The campus is a "neighborhood" for UGA students. No one wants to wake up at the crack of dawn on a Saturday to a party at his or her front door. For this reason, fans are allowed to arrive early on campus and park in open parking lots in advance of games as long as they do not begin creating noise or setting up tailgate equipment prior to 7 a.m. Gameday begins no earlier than 7 a.m. Saturday morning. Prior to that, a quiet environment must be preserved for students who call campus home.

PARK IN AN APPROVED SPACE

We've all seen it — one car, surrounded by a grill, seven chairs and three coolers, filling four parking spaces while you drive in circles. This type of parking forces others farther away from the stadium. Additional parking hazards are created when cars are parked on sidewalks or landscaped areas, pushing fans into the street and creating safety issues and traffic jams.

Rest assured, there are enough spaces for everyone on campus for gameday. All public access parking on campus is first come, first served, which means no saving places for friends.

BRING TRASH BAGS

Following games, students and local residents are left to face the aftermath of the previous day's festivities. On an average gameday, more than 39 tons of garbage are collected from the campus. That number can swell to more than 100 tons after a night game! Many fans leave town after the game unaware of the effort involved in restoring the campus and community to its picturesque state.

To help control this, there are hundreds of trash receptacles placed in heavy-traffic areas around the campus. We ask that you please bag your trash and either take it with you or leave it at your tailgating area. The UGA clean-up crew will gladly remove it for you. Placing trash in bags makes the postgame cleanup faster and more effective.

DON'T FORGET A POWER SOURCE

Pregame festivities have become increasingly high-tech in recent years. Televisions, satellite dishes and sound systems are now common sights in the midst of parked cars, lounge

NOTE: For safety reasons, certain items are not allowed on campus during gamedays, including:

- Propane tanks or cylinder containing compressed gas are not allowed for any purpose (turkey fryers, low country boils, grills, or portable heaters). This regulation does not apply to grills using disposable propane canisters of 17 ounces or less.
- Grills inside of or on top of parking decks.
- Golf carts and ATVs.

Additional restrictions for North Campus are in place to reduce physical damage to grounds and mitigate behavioral concerns. North Campus is defined as the area bounded by Broad Street, Lumpkin Street, Baldwin Street and Jackson Street (including, but not limited to, the quadrangle between Broad Street and Old College, the quadrangle between Old College and the Main Library, and Herty Field).

- Tailgating on North Campus is allowed beginning five (5) hours before kickoff.
- Tables cannot exceed six feet.
- Tents are allowed.

The following items are not allowed on North Campus on gamedays:

- Kegs
- Generators
- Televisions
- Amplified music
- Grills or cookers of any type
- Household furniture
- (foldings chairs not included)

GRAB A SNACK OR MEAL ON CAMPUS

Don't feel like preparing a meal on gameday? Whether it is just a snack or a full meal, a host of dining options, convenient to parking areas, are available to fans on campus. UGA Foodservices serves hearty fare at multiple locations on gameday, including East Village Commons, the Georgia Center for Continuing Education and the Bolton Dining Hall.

ARTIFICIAL NOISEMAKERS

Any artificial noisemakers (air horns, cowbells, etc.) are not permitted in Sanford Stadium. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Please keep portable radios at a low volume.

ATMs

With the addition of credit/bank card capabilities at all stadium points of sale, ATMs are no longer available inside Sanford Stadium. For guests needing access to an ATM on gameday, available machines are located outside the stadium in the Tate Center plaza. Spectators inside the stadium will not be able to leave the stadium to use an ATM and then re-enter the stadium.

CONCESSIONS

UGA Athletics would like to remind all fans that transactions at our concessions stands are contactless. Methods of payment accepted include AMEX, Discover, Mastercard and Visa.

Also to assist in making your gameday experience a good one, UGA Athletics has focused on making the "core concessions items" more affordable for you and your guests. The following items have reduced pricing for the 2023 football season.

- During any emergency inside the stadium, follow the directions of the announcer, event staff and emergency responders. Assist individuals who may not be able to hear the emergency announcements.
- Always designate a pre-determined location both inside and outside the stadium to meet friends and family in case you get separated or in the event of an emergency.
- Upon arriving at your seat location, first find the nearest exit/emergency exit and then locate an alternate exit in case of an emergency.
- Specific emergency instructions are provided for the guests in the sky suites and other private areas. Patrons at those locations should read and be familiar with the emergency evacuation instructions located there.
- Do not use elevators in the event of a fire evacuation or power failure.
- Listen to AM 1650 for gameday traffic updates.
- If you see or become aware of any activity that is unusual, suspicious or causes you concern, please report the activity to the nearest police officer or event personnel.
- Remember, text messaging may be an option when voice phone calls do not work.

FACULTY GATES

Faculty members are encouraged to use Gates 6, 7, 8 and 9. Each person is required to show proper UGA identification along with faculty season tickets.

FAN TEXT MESSAGE SYSTEM

The Athletic Association has implemented a text messaging system that allows fans to communicate directly with the stadium's command post if assistance is needed in dealing with any special needs inside the stadium.

Should fans need assistance while inside the stadium, they will be able to contact event management staff by sending a text message from their phone. Simply text "DAWGS <space> the Issue and Location of incident" to 69050. Please note that standard SMS rates apply. Be sure to include the problem and location of the incident, including section row and seat number (if applicable) in the message.

DISABLED SERVICES

Wheelchair seating is located in the West End of Sanford Stadium, three locations at the top of the lower level, as well as the 600 level. All spaces are reserved and must be purchased at regular price through the Ticket Office.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In case of an emergency, the public address announcer will notify fans of developing situations in order to make informed decisions concerning their well-being. Please familiarize yourself with the nearest exit points of the stadium.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR GAMEDAY EMERGENCIES

- Monitor the weather prior to the game. Take the necessary precautions to protect your family and friends should severe weather be encountered before, during or after the game.
- In the event of an emergency inside the stadium, remain calm at all times, assist others and, if necessary, leave in an orderly fashion.

FIRST AID INFORMATION

First Aid Room Locations:

- Section 119
- Section 202 (Club Level)
- Section 229 (Club Level)
- West end zone

Paramedics, nurses and physicians are stationed in all First Aid Rooms. First Aid volunteers also are located throughout the concourses. A First Aid station is located at Gate 7 of the 300 Level.

If assistance is needed with a health emergency, please report the situation immediately to any of the stadium ushers, Red Cross volunteers or uniformed police officers. Red Cross volunteers wear white shirts with the Red Cross emblem on the shoulder.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES



GAME PROGRAM/ROSTER CARD

Game Programs will no longer be sold. Game Programs are free and available digitally. They can be found at georgiadogs.com/digital. Roster Cards will be available free of charge inside Sanford Stadium at Gates 2, 6, 7, 9 and 10.

GATE INFORMATION

All gates open two hours prior to kickoff. There are new locations for Gate 1 and Gate 9. These gates will now be on the Gillis Bridge as a portion of the bridge on the West side will now be inside the stadium and a ticketed area on game days. Gate 9 will now have two entry points: 1) one entering on the bridge at the new gate 9 plaza; 2) one entering at the top of the 100 level.

HELP

Spectators are urged to arrive at their seats well in advance of kickoff. Excessive movement on the part of spectators during the game is a common complaint to our Game Administration officials.

As a courtesy to other patrons, please remain in your seat until the play has ended.

INFORMATION STATIONS/SILVER DAWGS

Look for Bulldog Information Stations outside and throughout Sanford Stadium for event, stadium and public information. Located at Gates 2, 6 and 9, these customer service stands are the best source to answer your gameday questions. The Silver Dawgs, a volunteer group who welcome and greet guests to the University of Georgia campus, can be found outside around the stadium as well as inside on the concourses. They can provide gameday information too.

PATRON SERVICES

Event service personnel are authorized to conduct an inspection of patrons upon entering the stadium for the sole purpose of eliminating hard objects and containers of any type from entering the stadium. Crowd control officers and stadium ushers are available to handle any inconveniences you may experience in the stadium.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Stadium security has the right to inspect any item at any time for the purpose of spectator safety. Prohibited items must be returned to cars or disposed of before entry. Prohibited items include:

- Non-clear bags
- Backpacks
- Clear bags larger than 12"x12"
- Laser pointers
- Thermos bottles
- Bottles and cans
- Infant seats
- Strollers
- Artificial noisemakers
- Umbrellas
- Weapons of any kind
- Ice bags
- Hard-surfaced materials
- Ice Chests
- Food/drink containers
- Cameras with detachable lenses
- Seatbacks larger than 16" or that have arms or pockets

RESTROOMS

Ladies' and men's restrooms are located on all concourses. Family restrooms are located in Reed Plaza, the 600 level of the North Side of the stadium and the 100 level Southside Concourse near Section 128.

SIGNS

Signs, banners, pictures, etc. that are offensive to individuals and teams, that are not in good taste, that block the view of spectators, or that create a safety hazard will not be allowed. The hanging or displaying of signs on stadium walls, bleacher areas, ramps or an area of proximity to the stadium is prohibited as a safety precaution.

In the event of a special banner day being conducted, all signs and/or banners will be admitted through Gate 10 and must be pre-approved by game administration personnel.

STADIUM SEATBACK LEASE & CUSTOMER SERVICE LOCATIONS

On gamedays only and subject to availability, seatbacks can be leased for \$10 on a single game basis.

Returning for the 2023 season is the MVP Seatback, available for all seats located in the Club Level sections of Sanford Stadium.

Season packages can be ordered at www.ugabulldogseats.com or by calling 1-866-910-9293. On gamedays, fans wanting to lease seatbacks for a single game or season and needing assistance with their seatbacks, can visit any of the customer service locations at Gates 2, 6, 7 and 9 and outside Sections 123 and 124.

TICKETS

- All persons must have a ticket regardless of age.
- No re-entry is permitted at any gate. If you leave the stadium, you must have a new ticket to be admitted.
- Holder of the ticket is restricted to section, row and seat of ticket held.
- UGA student tickets require a valid student ID.
- Private party ticket transactions will be made at the buyer's own risk. The Athletic Association cannot guarantee authenticity of tickets purchased from sources other than the Athletic Association and its authorized ticket locations.
- All sales are final.
- Tickets cannot be refunded nor replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed.
- The University of Georgia Athletic Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.
- Holder of tickets to the University of Georgia athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and university policies.
- When available, reserved tickets will be on sale at the East End Ticket Windows (East Campus Road) the day of the game.

Cash, Visa, Discover, Mastercard and American Express are the only forms of payment that will be accepted the day of the game.

ANY TICKET HOLDER APPREHENDED IN SANFORD STADIUM WITH AN INTOXICANT WILL BE SUBJECT TO EJECTION WITHOUT REFUND.

TOBACCO PRODUCTS

In accordance with the University System of Georgia policy, the Georgia Athletic Association has declared all areas of Sanford Stadium smoke/tobacco free. This includes all smokeless tobacco, smoking devices, electronic cigarettes and vaping. Anyone violating this policy will be subject to removal from the stadium.



n the last 100 years of intercollegiate football, Georgia's Uga has established himself as the nation's most wellknown mascot. The line of pure white English bulldogs, which epitomizes everything Georgia, has been owned by the Frank W. "Sonny" Seiler family of Savannah, Georgia, since Uga I first graced the campus in 1956. Through the years, Uga has been defined by his spiked collar, a symbol of the position in which he holds. He was given his name, an abbreviation for the university, by William Young of Columbus, a law school classmate of Seiler. Each of the Uga mascots is awarded a varsity letter in the form of a plaque, identical to those presented to all Bulldog athletes who letter in their respective sports.

As determined and published by the Pittsburgh Press, the University of Georgia is the only major college that actually buries its mascots within the confines of the stadium. Ugas I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII are buried in marble vaults near the main gate in the embankment of the South stands. Epitaphs to the dogs are inscribed in bronze, and before each home game, flowers are placed on their graves. The memorial plot attracts hundreds of fans and visitors each year. For the past 20 years, Uga's jerseys have been custom-made at the beginning of each season from the same material used for the players' jerseys. Old jerseys are destroyed.

Uga's on-field home is a permanent air conditioned doghouse located next to the cheerleader's platform, providing comfort in the heat of August and September. The custom-made doghouse is a gift from the Bahamian Bulldog Club of Nassau, Bahamas, through the courtesy of Fred Hazlewood.

UGA I (1956-66) RECORD: 53-48-6

The Uga line of solid white English bulldogs began with Uga I, Hood's Ole Dan, born Dec. 2, 1955, in Columbus, Georgia. Uga I was given to Cecelia Seiler by friend, Frank Heard, and appeared in his first game during the 1956 home opener. As recalled by Sonny Seiler, "... his original red jerseys were made by Cecelia ... There is no telling how many of these jerseys he wore out."

Epitaph: Damn Good Dog

UGA II (1966-72) RECORD: 42-16-3

Uga I was succeeded by his son, Ole Dan's Uga, at a 1966 pregame Homecoming ceremony. With the Redcoat Band lining the field, Uga II was led to its center by Charles Seiler. The student body erupted in a cheer, "Damn Good Dog!" Uga II had an impressive reign as Georgia participated in five bowl games and won two SEC championships. Epitaph: Not Bad for A Dog

UGA IV (1981-89) RECORD: 77-27-4

Uga IV was the most active of all Georgia mascots, standing as the only one to attend a bowl game every year of his service. He took over for Uga III in 1981. The highlight of his career was his appearance at the Heisman Trophy Banquet with Herschel Walker in 1982. He donned his game jersey and added the formal touch of a collar and black tie. Uga IV was the first mascot invited to the Heisman Banquet. Declared "Dog of the Decade" by Vince Dooley, he was posthumously awarded the highest UGA mascot honor, the varsity letter.

Epitaph: The Dog of the Decade

UGA V (1990-99) RECORD: 65-39-1

Uga V began his reign after his father's death in February. Uga V was the last pup sired by Uga IV and was born March 6, 1990. He was named in honor of Dan Magill, former Assistant Athletic Director for Public Relations, longtime tennis coach and SID.

Uga V was known by his appearance on the cover of the April 1997 Sports Illustrated declaring him the "nation's best college mascot." He presided over Georgia's most successful collective sports effort as it claimed four NCAA team titles during 1998-99 (gymnastics, women's swimming & diving, men's tennis, men's golf), placing second in the Directors' Cup race. He died just months after his retirement on Nov. 22, 1999.

Epitaph: "Nation's Best College Mascot" — Sports Illustrated

UGA VI (1999-2008) RECORD: 87-27

The pregame passing of the bone ceremony from Uga V to son, Whatchagot Loran, took place at the 1999 South Carolina contest. Only a year old at his coronation, Uga VI stood as the biggest of all Uga mascots weighing 65 pounds, 20 pounds heavier than his father. In 2007, Uga VI passed Uga IV for the most wins of any bulldog in school history. The fall of 2008 would have been his 10th season after reigning over more games than any mascot with 114.

He died June 27, 2008.

Epitaph: A Big Dog For A Big Job, And He Handled It Well

UGA VII (2008-09) RECORD: 16-7

Uga VII was introduced on Aug. 30, 2008. "Loran's Best" officially became Uga VII, prior to the Georgia Southern game. He was escorted onto the field by members of the Seiler family.

UGA III (1972-80) RECORD: 71-32-2

Born Oct. 9, 1972, Seiler's Uga III was present for Georgia football's finest moment as Herschel Walker took the Bulldogs to the 1980 national championship. Uga III led Georgia to six bowl games in nine years and closed out his career in ultimate fashion winning the 1980 NCAA championship. He retired on the 105th football game of his career, marking the season-opener of the 1981 season.

He died just weeks later. Epitaph: How 'Bout This Dawg

Uga VII passed away unexpectedly Nov. 19 of heart-related causes, before the final home game of 2009. A wreath was placed on his doghouse, and players wore a special UGA VII decal on their helmets to remember him during that final home game. "Russ," his 5-year-old half brother, served as mascot for the final two games of the season.

Epitaph: Gone Too Soon

UGA VIII (2010) RECORD: 4-2

Born Sept. 12, 2009, Uga VIII was the grandson of Uga VI, named in honor of Dr. Bruce Hollett from the UGA School of Veterinary Medicine. Uga VIII was introduced at the Homecoming game against Vanderbilt and served six games before becoming ill. He was diagnosed on Jan.

7, 2011 with lymphoma, passing away in his sleep on Feb. 4, 2011.

Epitaph: He Never Had A Chance

UGA IX (2012-15) RECORD: 44-19

Uga IX, formerly "Russ," the half-brother of Uga VII, served as an interim Bulldog mascot for a total of 25 games. He worked nine games during the 2009 and 2010 seasons after Uga VII and VIII passed away. He roamed the sidelines at all 14 games during the 2011 season. He then served for two wins at the beginning of the 2012 season before being promoted as Uga IX prior to the Florida Atlantic game on Sept. 15, 2012. His time as mascot has included the 2011 and 2012 SEC Eastern Division championships, three road wins at Georgia Tech and a victory over Texas A&M in the 2009 Independence Bowl in Shreveport, Louisiana. He completed 2012 with a 12-2 record and a win over Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl and finished 2013 with an 8-5 overall record and 2014 at 10-3.

UGA X (2015-22) RECORD: 76-18

Uga IX officially retired as the Bulldogs' mascot at the end of the 2014 season. After a three-month "audition" in that role, his grandson "Que" was formally crowned as his successor in a collaring ceremony prior to the Georgia-Georgia Southern game on Nov. 21, 2015. Que assumed the title of Uga X at the age of 2 1/2 years. During his audition, he made appearances at the Countdown to Kickoff event in July 2015, as well as Picture Day in August, before presiding over the entirety of the 2015 football season. Que capped his inaugural season by leading the team to a 24-17 victory over Penn State at the 2016 Taxslayer Bowl.

In the 2021 season, Que reached heights attained by just one of his ancestors, UGA III, when Georgia won the 2022 CFP National Championship Game. Que closed out his career with a second-consecutive national title, retiring after the 2022 season as the winningest mascot in program history.

UGA XI (2023-PRESENT) RECORD: 0-0

Following the retirement of Uga X, 10-month old puppy "Boom" assumed the vaunted role of Georgia's on-field mascot. During a pregame ceremony at the annual "G Day" game, University of Georgia president Jere W. Morehead joined J. Reid Parker Director of Athletics Josh Brooks and his son, Davis, in the ceremonial collaring of Boom. Boom is the 11th solid white English Bulldog to serve as Georgia's mascot since the line began in 1955.

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BYLAW 10.5 OF THE SEC SPORTSMANSHIP

G

Il institutional staff members and student-athletes of a member institution, shall conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their behavior shall at all times reflect the high standards of honor and dignity that characterize participation in the collegiate setting. For intercollegiate athletics to promote the character development of participants, to enhance the integrity of higher education and to promote civility in society, coaches, student-athletes and all others associated with these athletics programs and events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifest not only in athletics participation but also in the broad spectrum of activities affecting the athletics program.



COMPETITION AREA ACCESS

Access to the competition area shall be limited to participating student-athletes, coaches, officials, support personnel and properly-credentialed individuals at all times. For the safety of participants and spectators alike, at no time before, during or after a contest shall spectators be permitted to enter the competition area. It is the responsibility of each member institution to implement procedures to ensure compliance with this policy.

Institutional penalties against individuals who improperly enter the competition area shall include, but not be limited to, expulsion from the facility, arrest for trespassing and the loss of future ticket privileges. In addition to these three penalties, violators who are students shall be subject to institutional student disciplinary measures.





HOW TO COMPLY WITH THE NCAA AND SEC GUIDE TO COMPLIANCE

STEP 2: Know the Rules



Recruiting All recruiting must be conducted by the coaches



Benefits

You may not provide current or prospective student-athletes with impermissible benefits such as cash, travel, clothing, etc.



Marketing

Student-athletes may now use their name, image or likeness (NIL) to promote commercial entities. There are specific NCAA rules and institutional policies related to permissible NIL activities. See more info at georgiadogs.com/ sports/2021/8/2/nil-policy.aspx



Loss of Opportunity

Current or prospective student-athletes may be declared ineligible to compete or receive athletic financial aid



Loss of Wins

Victories obtained while playing ineligible student-athletes may be forfeited and vacated

Disassociation

Boosters guilty of violations may be barred from the University of Georgia Athletics events



Sanctions

The University of Georgia may receive penalties from the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations

TOP 10 THINGS TO KNOW



Breaking NCAA rules can render prospects and current student-athletes ineligible to compete at the University of Georgia.



You **may not** become involved in arranging for a prospect, a current student-athlete or their friends or family to receive money or financial assistant of any kind.



The University of Georgia can be sanctioned by the NCAA through probation, loss of scholarship and postseason bans for violations committed by boosters and fans.



You **may not** employ student-athletes and/or prospects without approval.



You **may not** provide a meal to a current student-athlete at your home or on campus without the University of Georgia Compliance approval.



You **may not** spend funds to entertain or provide transportation to prospects, current student-athletes or their friends or family.



University of Georgia supporters are encouraged to engage in legitimate NIL activities with current studentathletes. All NIL deals must be disclosed to Compliance and comply with University of Georgia policies, SEC and NCAA rules, and state and federal laws. Please contact a member of the compliance staff if you have questions.



You **may not** provide prospects or current student-athletes with impermissible benefits such as cash, clothing, travel expenses, etc.



You **may not** be directly involved in recruiting prospects on behalf of the University of Georgia.
